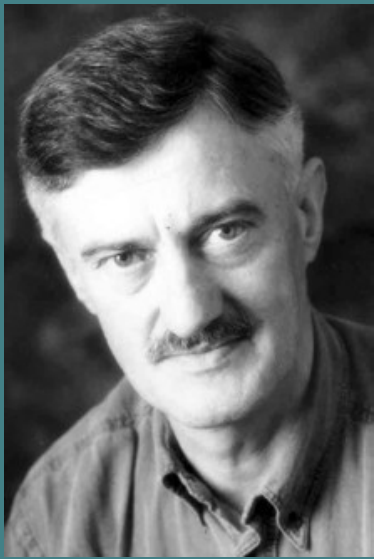



His poetry collections include *Poaching Rights* (1987); *The Weakness* (1991); *Gunpowder* (1995), winner of the 1995 Whitbread Poetry Award; *Here Nor There* (1999); *Outliving* (2003); and a translation in verse of *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight* (2006).
